When I was 8 years old, I learned how to create a wish list on ToysRUs.com during the holiday season. It's pretty crazy that I was able to without any help. However, it's not. The site made it simple enough for me to do so. That's the kind of experience I want to create for the world.

During my last years at Howard University, I was introduced to web development and human computer interaction. As someone who gets bored easily, these subjects stimulated my mind like a caffeine rush. I realized that I would spend hours coding and designing, but neglect other studies.
